Pioneer Christian Hospital continues to receive hundreds of patients every month. And so far a hundred or so patients and family members have made decisions for Christ in 2012. On Easter Sunday another 5 people got baptized, bringing the total to 10 so far this year.

Public Enemy Number One strikes too close to home

When we moved to the Town of Impfondo in 1999, the population was around 10,000. There are now 90,000 people living in Impfondo! The motorcycle taxi is quickly overtaking the machete and mango tree as the number one

cause of trauma in this boom town. For merely 500 francs (about a dollar) you can be conveyed across town in a matter of minutes, laid up for a few weeks, or ushered into eternity! It all depends on the care and skill of your driver and the condition of his motorbike. The vast majority of the hundreds of motorcycle taxis in town are not registered, don't have insurance, and their drivers may have never ridden a bicycle, let alone taken the time to get a driver's license. Add to that the fact that people here have not been brought up being taught about the dangers of drinking and driving, or even to look both ways before they cross the street—there was no street when they grew up. The result: at Pioneer Christian Hospital we treat 2-3 motorcycle-pedestrian collision victims every day with a huge variety of injuries.

One Tuesday a few weeks ago, our beloved Sarah Speer became one of the many victims. While riding her bicycle home from the new leprosy center that she is building on the outskirts of town, she was turning in to the entrance of the mission when she was struck from behind by a

motorcycle taxi whose driver and passenger had both been drinking. As she was thrown with her bike to the asphalt, her left arm and right rib broke and she suffered a big cut on her finger. Dr. Wegner was on call. He got her patched up at Pioneer Christian Hospital in short order. After a few days of nursing care, and plenty of rest, we thought she was on the mend, but when her cast got soft an x-ray revealed that her ulna was not healing as quickly or as straight as we would like. The current plan is for her to travel home to Canada to have a plate put in. This experience and many other close calls has strengthened our resolve to lead a public health campaign to encourage rational use of modern conveniences through road safety education, traffic law enforcement, driving standards, and helmets.

Radio Sango Kitoko

In March we received government authorization to start an FM radio station on the hospital compound. Why have a community radio station hosted by a hospital? Our main objective is to promote health and healing. True healing begins with spiritual healing. We seek to treat the whole person: body, soul, and spirit. For a long time we've noticed that we keep treating the same problems over and over and over again (like malaria and motorcycle accidents). Since God first gave us the vision for starting Pioneer Christian Hospital, one of our goals has been to have a Christian radio station to facilitate the spiritual care of our patients, follow-up discharged patients, and primary public health programs to combat preventable disease and injury. Now we have a green light from the government, but once again, we lack personnel. We would dearly like to have someone come and champion this effort. For now our interim chaplain, Pastor Paul Mboumba is coordinating the launch of this station. Stay tuned!



Power to the People

Saving premature babies and critically ill patients is often easier to do if electricity is available. It's also easier to treat broken bones when you have X-ray or ultrasound, both of which depend on electricity. The PCH Power Project is well underway. Two new 25 kilowatt generators have been ordered. We are preparing to order panels and batteries to double our solar capacity. An awesome team from Christ Chapel in N. Madison, Connecticut, was here for 3 weeks to begin construction of a new power house for the hospital. It is exciting to see well-thought-out plans materialize.

This project is probably going to cost more than we thought, and is taking longer than we hoped. Our main hold up is lack of qualified

personnel to do ongoing maintenance and construction at the hospital. Please pray for this project to successfully provide a stable, low maintenance, automated source of green power for the hospital.
